



Thought you should know...

Massachusetts

The winner of the Special Senate Election in Massachusetts on Tuesday, January 19th could decide the fate of important policy proposals currently under debate in Congress.

Health care legislation now under consideration could:

- Hit Americans with 18 separate tax hikes.
- Risk losing 22,000 high-paying Massachusetts jobs.⁶

Energy tax legislation that Congress is expected to take up soon could:

- Raise our household energy costs between \$800 and \$1300 annually by 2015.⁷
- Cost up to 1.2 to 2.3 million in total jobs lost.⁷

There are major differences between the two candidates on these issues and FreedomWorks thought you should know before casting your vote on **Tuesday, January 19th!**

Martha Coakley (D)



- Supports the **health care legislation** being discussed in the Senate that is riddled with tax hikes including a new tax on health insurance plans, \$2 billion in new tax on medical device manufactures, and higher income and Medicare taxes. The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) says this will raise premiums. Supporters need 60 votes to pass this bill and Coakely said:

“I’d be proud to be the 60th vote”¹
- Supports **energy tax legislation—the “light switch tax”**—that would raise taxes and take away American jobs.²

Scott Brown (R)



- Opposes the job killing and tax raising **health care legislation** being discussed in the Senate that the CBO says will raise health insurance premiums. Opponents of the bill need 41 votes to stop it. Brown said he will vote against it if elected.³

“I’m looking forward to having the opportunity to being the 41st vote” (01/10/2010)⁴
- Opposes **energy tax legislation** and supports responsibly leveraging our natural resources to create jobs and keep energy prices down.⁵
